## Intent

At Newlands, we believe that creativity, innovation and expression are key to inspire children to love and take part in high-quality art lessons allowing them to develop an inquisitive and imaginative mind. Our Art curriculum allows children to express themselves whilst providing them with the opportunity to develop their skills and talents whilst using a range of new and interesting media and materials. Children explore and learn new skills within drawing, painting, printing, collage, textiles and digital media. We encourage our children to evaluate and critique their own learning and the learning of others whilst introducing them to works, vocabulary and styles from a vast range of different artists from around the world. Key skills which are taught in Art lessons are applied to their cross-curricular topics, allowing children to reflect on and explore topics in a much greater depth. It is very important that our art lessons and our art learning show clear purpose; whether this be as a means of expression or to explore the styles of other artists that may inspire our own learning. At Newlands we promote a reflective nature towards our learning, thinking about how we can make changes and keep improving and expressing our thoughts in the best way possible. This should always be meaningful and continuous throughout the learning process, with encouragement given to take risks and experiment and then reflect upon the successfulness of our ideas, techniques and outcomes.

## <u>Implementation</u>

We have a comprehensive progression of skills in Art for staff to follow to best embed and cover every element of the Art national curriculum objectives. The knowledge/skills statements build year on year to deepen and challenge our learners within a range of different disciplines. A detailed and comprehensive vocabulary list is made available to each member of staff within each of the areas of Art. A means to display and celebrate the learning of children is made visually clear within school alongside a clear and detailed evaluative process for children to complete within each year group.
