Empire	A group of states or countries ruled over by a single monarch, government or a sovereign state.
Colosseum	A large theatre, cinema or stadium.
Gladiator	A man trained to fight with weapons against other men or wild animals in an arena.
Centurion	The commander of a century in the ancient Roman army.
Invasion	To invade a country or region with an armed force.
Settlements	Places where people establish a community.
Kingdoms	A country, state, or territory ruled by a king or queen.
Angles and Saxons	Two different tribes of people from Germany, who invaded and settled in England in the 5th and 6 <sup>th</sup> centuries AD.
Picts	A member of an ancient people inhabiting northern Scotland in Roman times.
Jutes	A tribe of German people who joined the Angles and Saxons in invading Britain in the 5th century, settling in a region including Kent and the Isle of Wight.
Christianity	The religion based on the teachings of Jesus Christ, or its beliefs and practices.
Scandinavia	A region of Europe made up of Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, and Iceland, as well as the Faroe Islands, Greenland, and Åland.
Conquer	To overcome and take control, usually by using military force.
Monastery	A building or buildings occupied by a community of monks living under religious vows.
