Pop art: this is an art movement that challenged fine art by including pictures from popular culture (advertising).

Colour palette: this is the full range of colours that can be displayed.

Image: this is a picture or photo.

Style: this is how the artist chooses to express themselves.

Subject: this is the focus of the piece of art.

Perspective: in art, perspective involves representing a 3D object on a flat 2D surface.

Imitate/replicate: this means to produce an exact copy of something.

Photo booth: this is a small booth for someone to sit in and take pictures of themselves

Pop art camera: this is the camera Warhol used to take his pictures

Photo editor: this allows us to alter and change photos.

Sticky Knowledge

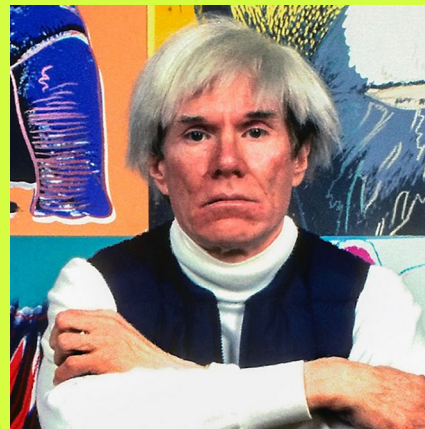
To replicate a photo in the style of Andy Warhol, take a photo on an iPad and save it to the library. Then edit the photo in order to truly use Warhol's style.
